

## **Information about the Request for NEPT11-25, NEPT11-26, NEPT11-27, NEPT11-28**

On 12 July 2019, the Commission imposed a definitive anti-dumping duty on imports into the Union of ceramic tableware and kitchenware ('the product concerned') originating in the People's Republic of China (the PRC) by Implementing Regulation (EU) 2019/1198.

In the original investigation, sampling was applied for investigating the exporting producers in the PRC in accordance with Article 17 of Regulation (EU) 2016/1036.

The Commission imposed individual anti-dumping duty rates ranging from 13.1% to 23.4% on imports of the product concerned manufactured by the sampled exporting producers. For the cooperating exporting producers that were not included in the sample, a duty rate of 17.9% was imposed. The cooperating exporting producers not included in the sample are listed in Annex I of Regulation (EU) 2019/1198. Furthermore, a country-wide duty rate of 36.1% was imposed on the product concerned from companies in the PRC which either did not make themselves known or did not cooperate with the investigation.

Pursuant to Article 2 of Regulation (EU) 2019/1198, the Commission may amend Annex I of that Regulation by granting a new exporting producer the duty rate applicable to the cooperating companies not sampled or not granted individual treatment, namely the weighted average duty rate of 17,9 %, where any new exporting producer in the PRC provides sufficient evidence to the Commission that:

- (a) it did not export to the Union the product concerned during the period of investigation on which the measures are based, that is from 1 January 2011 to 31 December 2011 ('the original investigation period'),
- (b) it is not related to any of the exporters or producers in the PRC which are subject to the anti-dumping measures imposed by the original Regulation, and
- (c) it has actually exported to the Union the product concerned after the end of the original investigation period or has entered into an irrevocable contractual obligation to export a significant quantity to the Union.

The Commission has received requests to grant new exporting producer treatment ('NEPT') status and hence also the duty rate applicable to cooperating companies not included in the sample from four Chinese exporting producers:

1. Yuzhou Yongxingli Ceramics Co., Ltd.
2. Chaozhou Jingmei Craft Products Co., Ltd.
3. Guangxi Kahome Housewares Co., Ltd.
4. Shenzhen M&G Ceramics Co., Ltd.

The Commission is currently examining these requests in order to determine whether the applicants fulfil the criteria for being granted NEPT status, as set out in Article 2 of Regulation (EU) 2019/1198.

In order to participate in the investigation interested parties, such as exporting producers, Union producers, importers and their representative associations, users and their representative associations, trade unions and representative consumer organisations have to make themselves known and to demonstrate that there is an objective link between their activities and the product under investigation. Interested parties have the possibility to provide comments concerning the request for NEPT or request hearings. Only interested parties have access to the non-confidential file of the case. All interested parties wishing to comment on the request for NEPT must do so within 37 days of the publication of this Notice.

Interested parties are invited to make all submissions and requests by email including scanned powers of attorney and certification sheets, with the exception of voluminous submissions which shall be submitted on a CD-ROM or DVD or USB by hand or by registered mail. The interested parties must indicate their name, address, telephone and a valid email address and they should ensure that the provided email address is a functioning official business email which is checked on a daily basis. Once contact details are provided, the Commission will communicate with interested parties by email only, unless they explicitly request to receive all documents from the Commission by another means of communication or unless the nature of the document to be sent requires the use of a registered mail. For further rules and information concerning correspondence with the Commission including principles that apply to submissions by email, interested parties should consult the communication instructions with interested parties referred to above.

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The hearing officer acts as an interface between the interested parties and the Commission investigation services. The hearing officer may, upon request by any interested party organise a hearing and mediate to ensure the full exercise of the interested parties' rights of defence. The hearing officer also reviews requests for access to the file, disputes on the confidentiality of documents, requests for extension of time limits and requests of third persons to be heard.
